## Prayer focus: THE RAREST GRACE?

At the same time came the disciples unto Jesus, saying, Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven? And Jesus called a little child unto him, and set him in the midst of them, And said, Verily I say unto you, Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven. (Matthew 18:1-3)

Fellow believers, you who are serving in one of the military services of this country, do you believe what most of the holy and wisest of the thinkers of the Reformation believed, namely that pride is the mother of all other sins, and that genuine humility is the rarest—and the most beautiful of all the Christian graces (J.C.Ryle)?

Our blessed Saviour and Commander-in-Chief, Jesus Christ on more than one occasion warned against the danger of pride. Consider one of the occasions when the disciples were arguing among themselves (Matthew 18:1) as to which one of them would be the greatest in the kingdom of heaven—a blatant exercise in self promotion and unblushing self-serving arrogance! Cosmic pride!

To their sinful focus, Christ declared an astonishing correction, " ...unless you are converted, and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven" (v.2). Since children come into the world with a sin nature, and can display, without any prior instruction, jealous, angry, selfish, self-centered, unkind and many disobedient behaviors, what aspect of childhood, in general, could Christ possibly use that would clearly exemplify God blessed, heavenward (Colossians 3:1-2) thinking and behaving?

The inescapable conclusion is that this remarkable form of humility, indeed one of its most helpful examples, is the unrecognized, common grace type of humility found in little children, growing up on a loving home. That early humility comes in two ways (almost always lost by adulthood unless saving grace triumphs). One is the unembarrassed, unashamed and unquestioning acceptance of the fact of their total dependence on the life-sustaining care furnished by their parents. The other

way childhood humility has redemptive illustration is when children, in a loving home do not question their acceptance as beloved individuals, who do not need to strive for acceptance by the parents through personal achievement and earned merit. The Gospel calls for both these aspects of saving faith in Christ.

Thus the common problem of one's ultimate status, for the believer, is beautifully resolved, "Whoever then humbles himself as this child, he is the greatest on the kingdom of heaven." This is a powerful truth for those who labor in a meritorious system where the temptations to strive for personal advancement are numerous.

Confidence in Christ's magnificent promise can be revealed in many ways, all scriptural, such as refusing to return evil for evil; the willingness to confess sin and with a repentant heart seek forgiveness; the willingness to practice careful speech combined with careful listening (cf. Matthew 12:36-37); the willingness to serve humbly without trying to obtain recognition or credit for it (Luke 17:6-10); and so forth, thus being an effective witness to Christ in a world becoming more and more hostile to Him, and even the speaking of His name.

So, in our military culture, which reflects in many ways the prideful evils of the society which supports it, can a competent enlisted or commissioned Christian maintain a light and salt testimony that is grounded in Christ-centered humility? Absolutely! If we *trust* our Redeemer to honor His calls to practice humility as that of a little child (Matthew 23:10-12; Luke 14:11; 18:14). Dear reader; do *you* believe humility is a rare and beautiful grace from God? Do you believe a humble heart is an obedient heart (John 14:15)? Do you believe I Peter 5:5-6?

Please pray for our valiant men of war to call out to God continually for strength to enable victory over the enemy and that they will continue to be well equipped for battle. And please pray that our nation will be led by humble leaders who call on the name of the Lord and rule righteously that we might have peace. Please pray that God will *show himself strong in the behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him.* Pray that they will fear only God and not man and be of a good courage. Pray that they will be bold as a lion and that the wicked will flee. (Prov. 28:1)

Pray as we battle forces both foreign and domestic in our long war; plead with our God to make a way of escape from defeat, from losing heart in the battle and that in doing so, God will restore us as a nation to His righteousness. Pray for the gracious and needed gift from God of genuine national repentance; especially from the iniquities of abortion, supporting homosexuality, the widespread disregard of the fourth commandment and rejection of the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

Continue to pray that we will recognize the true nature of the enemy. Be not weary in hoping, praying and waiting to see the salvation of our great God whose new mercies come every morning! Pray that the Gospel may continue to have free expression. Pray that the culture of death will be defeated and that our nation will stand united and will endure in the defense of freedom. Please continue to pray for the spouses, children, parents and siblings of our warriors. Pray for the families of the fallen and for the wounded that they may all endure and come to rest and trust in Christ. May they defend our nation's liberties as guaranteed by our Constitution with stalwart hearts and minds!

His wife Shelly's verse through all of Bryan's serious health trial is Romans 12:12 *Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer.* Thank you and please continue to be in prayer for complete healing for Bryan and for his family as they support him.

  - 3. That the implementation of this legislation will be just and righteous,
  - 4. That the heretofore moral standards of our military will not be severely denigrated by those of good moral character leaving this godly calling,
  - 5. That the Committee and Commission will have wisdom in order to protect those who serve. Praise God that the Commission has adopted additional protections for our chaplains. Please pray that God will grant a powerful and sustained protection for our chaplains from this revision.
  - 6. That our military, which has taken an oath defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies foreign and domestic, will not be diminished or perish,
  - 7. That this trial will not also in time descend on the pulpits of our land.
